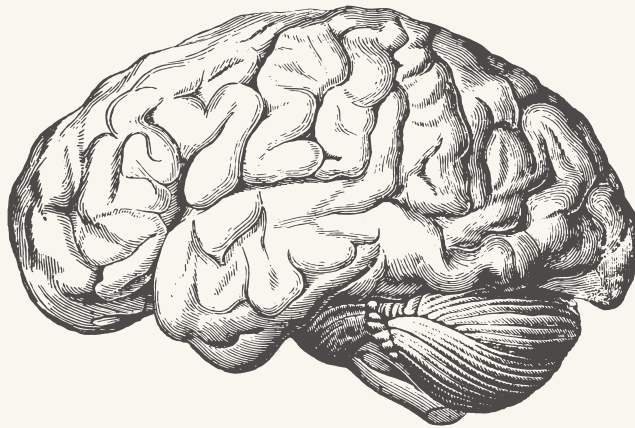


Top AI Tools That Actually Save You Time

*For Solopreneurs Who
Want to Work Smarter,

useful.

This guide is different.

save time, think faster, and build smarter – without

and start being free.

ChatGPT

What it's great for: Writing, brainstorming, answering questions, pretending you're not working alone

Saves time by: Helping you get started faster, write better, and stop staring into the void

My take: If I could only keep one tool, this would be it. I use ChatGPT for everything – writing emails, building outlines, testing ideas, even giving myself pep talks when I've had too much coffee and no direction.

It's not perfect (sometimes it sounds like a motivational speaker from LinkedIn), but it's fast, helpful, and way cheaper than therapy. It's like having a very polite intern who never sleeps, never complains, and always has something to say – even if you didn't ask.

 **Pro tip:** Give it context. Tell it who you are, what you're trying to do, and what tone you want. The better your prompt, the better the result.

Descript

What it's great for: Editing podcasts, videos, voiceovers – without actually knowing how to edit

Saves time by: Letting you cut, clean and rearrange your audio just by editing the text


My take: Descript is the only reason I've ever sounded like I know what I'm doing.

It lets me edit audio by just deleting words from a transcript – no timeline scrubbing, no tech headaches.

Suddenly, all my rambling voice notes sound tight, clear, and kind of professional.

I still don't like hearing my own voice, but at least now I can fix it instead of cringe in silence.

Also: Overdub lets you clone your voice and re-record words you forgot to say – without re-recording. It's lowkey sorcery.

 **Pro tip:** Use filler word removal – it can cut out every “uh”, “um”, and awkward pause in one click. You'll sound 10x smarter instantly.

Notion AI

What it's great for: Notes, tasks, documents, organizing your brain

Saves time by: Turning messy thoughts into structured lists, plans, or summaries in seconds


My take: I used to open Notion and stare at the blinking cursor like it owed me money.

Now I just write a half-baked thought and let Notion AI do the heavy lifting.

It can write summaries, brainstorm content, plan your week, or help you turn chaos into clean structure – all without rolling its eyes.

It's like hiring an A-student to clean up your digital life while you drink coffee and pretend you're in control.

Bonus: It lives inside your notes, so it's always one click away from saving your day.

 **Pro tip:** Ask it to summarize your meeting notes or turn a messy to-do list into a clear weekly plan. You'll feel 47% more organized instantly.

Gamma

What it's great for: Presentations, pitch decks, visual documents

Saves time by: Turning a bunch of messy bullet points into a clean, modern slide deck in minutes


My take: Gamma is like PowerPoint's younger, hotter cousin who actually understands how the internet works.

Instead of manually building slides like it's 2004, you just describe what you want – and it builds the whole thing.

Headlines, layouts, visuals, structure – done.

It's saved me hours, and occasionally saved me from looking like I had no plan.

Perfect for when you need to “look ready” without actually being ready.

 **Pro tip:** Start with a rough outline or paste in an old doc – Gamma will turn it into slides faster than you can pretend you weren't procrastinating.

Perplexity

What it's great for: Research, summaries, asking smarter questions


Saves time by: Giving you quick, cited answers instead of Googling for 45 minutes and opening 12 tabs

My take: Perplexity is what I wish Google was. You ask it something, and it actually answers the question – with sources, without hype, and without 10 SEO-bait blog posts in the way.

It's fast, clear, and weirdly humble for an AI tool.

Perfect when you want real answers, not just links.

Also useful for idea generation, competitor research, and writing stuff that doesn't sound like it was copied from a Wikipedia rabbit hole.

 **Pro tip:** Use "Focus Mode" when researching something deep – it lets you narrow the answer and ask follow-ups like a pro.


Claude

What it's great for: Long-form writing, deep reasoning, sensitive conversations

Saves time by: Keeping more context, writing more thoughtful responses, and sounding less robotic

My take: If ChatGPT is the smart, fast-talking assistant, Claude is the calm co-founder who actually listens. It handles longer conversations better, remembers what you said 5 minutes ago, and gives answers that feel more like thoughts than blurbs.

I use it when I'm stuck in complex writing, want a second brain for big ideas, or just need a more grounded vibe. Claude doesn't always show off, but when it hits – it really hits. And sometimes, that's exactly what I need.

 **Pro tip:** Ask Claude to write “like it's explaining something to a smart but tired friend” – the tone it finds is shockingly good.

Opus Clip


What it's great for: Turning long videos into short TikToks, Reels, or Shorts

Saves time by: Auto-cutting your content into bite-sized highlights with captions, cuts, and zooms

My take: Opus Clip is like that friend who watches your entire YouTube video and goes, "This part. Right here. That's the gold."

It uses AI to find the most engaging clips, adds captions, zooms, and edits everything into vertical-ready format. I've made usable short-form content without touching an editing timeline – and that's saying something.

It's not perfect, but if you're camera shy, lazy, or allergic to video editing... this thing is your new best friend.

 **Pro tip:** Start with a Zoom recording, webinar, or podcast. Upload the whole thing and let Opus Clip do the slicing. You'll look like a content machine with zero effort.

Durable


What it's great for: Instantly building websites for your business

Saves time by: Creating an entire site – with text, layout, and images – in under 60 seconds

My take: Durable is for the moment when you want to launch a business, but the idea of building a website makes you want to lie down.

You type in what you do – like “freelance designer” or “dog yoga therapist” – and Durable builds a working site with text, sections, and visuals.

It's not perfect, but it gets you from “blank page” to “something live” faster than you can overthink it. Also great if you just want to test an idea without hiring a designer or wrestling with WordPress.

 **Pro tip:** Use it to make quick landing pages for side projects, offers, or client pitches – even if you'll rebuild it later.

Rewind.ai

What it's great for: Remembering anything you've seen, said, or typed on your Mac


Saves time by: Making your entire digital brain searchable – like a time machine for your screen

My take: You know that moment when you know you read something last week, but have zero clue where it was? Rewind fixes that. It records everything you do (locally, not creepy), and lets you search through it like Google for your own memory.

It's helped me find lost tabs, recreate ideas I forgot to save, and even backtrack full conversations I thought were gone.

It's kind of terrifying – but also insanely useful.

Mac only for now, but once you try it, you'll wish it existed for your actual brain too.

 **Pro tip:** Use Rewind to track client calls, brainstorming, or research sessions – it's like having a perfect backup of your thinking.

Aiter.io

What it's great for: Building entire marketing funnels with landing pages, emails, and AI-written copy


Saves time by: Letting you create a full business funnel in minutes – even if you hate copywriting and tech

My take: Aiter is for those “I should sell this... but I can't be bothered” moments.

You give it an idea – like a course, service, or ebook – and it writes the emails, builds the landing page, sets up the thank-you flow, and makes it all feel way more legit than you thought possible.

It's like hiring a team of marketers, copywriters and designers – except they're all robots and don't need lunch breaks.

Perfect for solopreneurs who want results, not guesswork.

 **Pro tip:** Start with something simple – like a freebie or offer you already have – and let Aiter build the full funnel around it.

That's it. You made it.

10 tools I actually use – and now you can too. Hopefully one of them made you think “Damn... that would save me hours.” Because that's the goal. Less guesswork. More time. And maybe a little more momentum in whatever you're building.
